



The Crossover by Kwame Alexander

Twin basketball stars Josh and Jordan wrestle with highs and lows on and off the court as their father ignores his declining health.




Foul Trouble by John Feinstein


Ball Don't Lie by Matt De La Pena


Believe It! by Chicago Sun-times

Julio Ramirez Jr. is a shortstop from Cuba who dreams of playing with the pros must choose between his country and his father who defected to the U.S.




Center Field by Robert Lipsyte


Raiders Night by Robert Lipsyte


Pop by Gordon Korman


Keeper by Mal Peet
